

Funding Sources

Below you will find information on some funders to start you off on your search for funding for community projects. There are hundreds of funders but only a few may be useful to you for your project depending on your type of group, what you want to do, where, why, who for and costs to be covered. This list will become out of date very quickly so always check the funder's up to date website/funding guidance. When looking for funders think about the outcome of your project – how people will benefit e.g. improved health though physical activity, reduced isolation through engaging in activities, development of ICT skills to help a person search for jobs or reduce digital exclusion. Also think about ways of fundraising yourself, e.g. through: crowdfunding, using social media, encouraging people to donate on line, coffee mornings, events, raffles, gifts in kind, selling space, skills or services, community shares or sponsorship, selling a plaque on your new building for a donation, approaching people you know (companies, people in philanthropic groups such as Lions clubs) and so on.
