

Purpose of the Event: Since the start of the pandemic many of our organisations and groups have had to change to the way we operate. LMP, like many partnerships and networks, has only been able to meet online. This method of meeting has made working together and collaboration a real challenge. The March event was to bring partners together around our shared focus on how LMP can make your work easier, and more effective.

The Days of Future Past event enabled us all to re-connect, re-energise and decide

- How we can learn from the last year (the past)
- What are the current priorities for partners and LMP (the present)
- How LMP can support over the next year (the future)

Summary of the event: The event was attended by 20 partners who reflected the event was well pitched and received and that it was great to be back in a physical meeting once again. Broadly, partners reflected LMP plays an invaluable role, which many other cities don't have, and the desire for LMP to return to the original 3 strands as outlined in the terms of reference. There was enthusiasm amongst partners to contribute more toward LMP, although further considerations will be needed to explore how this takes place. Partners overwhelming voted for in-person meetings where possible. A more detailed summary of the event discussions is available below in respect of the agenda items of past, present and future. These will be further explored through LMP meetings.

Next steps: Following event feedback, LMP will return to the 3 strands to the partnership, the LMP blog where information is shared, the quarterly operations meetings where services share updates about projects/activities, and the quarterly strategy meetings which focus on the LMP priorities.
